

and the mysteries that have enthralled readers. The website was such a success that within a year the International Sister Fidelma Society was launched, which expanded the website to include a great deal more information on Peter, his books and focusing primarily on Fidelma. Soon after, David launched a print magazine, *The Brehon*, a thrice-yearly publication, which has expanded on our knowledge of Peter, carrying learned contributions from distinguished authors, as well as articles from Peter himself.

phenomenon, apart from Peter himself. The Compendium is a comprehensive collection of all the information available on the Fidelma Mysteries. The sheer scale of the work can be gleaned from a cursory look at the Table of Contents, which contains over forty chapters and ranges over all the questions that the reader might ask in over four hundred pages, And some intriguing questions are asked and discussed, so that no query is missed. I will mention just a few of the chapter headings: Was Sister Fidelma a real Historical Person?' 'The Fascination for Sister Fidelma.' 'Frequently Asked Questions,' etc. And there's a Pronunciation Guide for those unfamiliar with the Irish language. Even a map showing the locales of the novels in Ireland and abroad.

It can truly be said that David Robert Wooten has shown incredible energy and expertise in putting this Compendium together. He deserves outstanding praise and has rendered us all beholden to him for an outstanding work. He has also revealed a knowledge of the Fidelma Mysteries that is unrivalled. We owe him a huge debt of gratitude.
